Our Logo

Muyan (pronounced moo-yun) is a Wurundjeri Woi wurrung language word meaning silver wattle.

Our beautiful school logo was designed for Muyan PS by Nakia Cadd, a Gunditjmara, Yorta Yorta, Dja Dja Wurrung, Bunitj, Boon Wurrung, Taungurung woman who grew up in the Northern suburbs of Melbourne.

'Muyan', meaning Silver Wattle in the Woi Wurrung language of the Wurundjeri people, reflects the school's name and connection to the land it resides on. The logo pays homage to Wurundjeri Elders, past and present.



Purple is the primary colour, which symbolizes kindness and compassion. These are vital characteristics in fostering a safe and inclusive school community. The 'U' in the logo represents people: community, staff, students, and their families.

Each individual bears responsibility for shaping the school community, its values, and environment.

Wattle blooms in July and August. This season is characterized by increased animal activity and enhanced flora. With Muyan Primary School newly established, it embodies the perfect symbol of the school's aspiration to grow and thrive.

School Uniform

The Academy school bags come with a lifetime guarantee and we recommend that students use the bag as a way of showing pride in our school.

Student Book Packs

Student book packs will be available to purchase via an external supplier and delivered directly to the school for your child's use in 2026. These packs will include exercise books and other required stationery. We will endeavour to keep the cost of these packs to a minimum. Compass Platform

Compass is our School Management System and point of communication between school and home. Through the Compass Parent Portal you can access up-to-date information about the school and your child's progress. Some of the features of the parent portal include:

Eating Times and Processes

Muyan PS is thrilled to announce that we are part of the Food Bank School Breakfast Clubs Program. On set days of the week all students will be invited to attend Breakfast Club before school starts (further information will be emailed via Compass in early 2026).

We understand the benefits of eating at regular intervals throughout the day. Students will be required to have a packed lunch each day for school.

Throughout the day, students will be given time to eat. Our eating process is as follows:

- Brain food (fruit/ vegetables snack) time will be allocated in the classrooms at 9:40 am and 12:20 pm.
- Morning recess eating time 11:10am -11:20am
- Lunch eating time 1:50pm 2:00pm

Morning recess and Lunch eating times are allocated after outside play sessions and take place in the classrooms. This will support students to eat the contents of their lunchboxes without feeling they may miss outside play. Younger children will be provided ample time to consume their food.

We ask that foods requiring reheating not be brought to school as we can not accommodate heating lunches due to health and safety risks.



Curriculum

Our curriculum covers Literacy, Numeracy, Physical Education, the Arts, Performing Arts and Science/Humanities. We aim to cater to diverse student needs and foster a love of learning. In 2026 MPS will not run a language program, however we will be consulting with the community to identify a preferred language program to commence in 2027.

Our Literacy Program

Reading and writing are the foundations of all learning, which is why we take a comprehensive, research-based approach to literacy instruction. We explicitly teach students both how to read and how to write by developing essential skills in each area.

Reading Instruction

We teach students how to read by developing six essential components:

Phonemic Awareness (Sounds They Hear)

Students learn to identify and manipulate the individual sounds they hear in spoken words. This auditory skill helps children understand that words are made up of separate sounds, which is crucial for reading success.



Reading Instruction (continued)

Phonics (Decoding)

We teach students the relationship between letters and sounds, giving them the tools to decode unfamiliar words independently. Students learn systematic strategies to sound out words and recognize common spelling patterns.

Fluency (Reading Rate and Expression)

Students develop their reading rate, accuracy, and expression through guided practice and repeated reading. Fluent readers can focus their attention on understanding the text rather than struggling with individual words.

Background Knowledge of Topics We build students' knowledge across science, social studies, and other subjects, recognizing that what children know about the world directly impacts their reading comprehension. Rich content knowledge helps students make connections and understand what they read.

Vocabulary (Word Meanings)

Students expand their word knowledge through direct instruction and exposure to rich texts. We teach both the meanings of new words and strategies for figuring out unfamiliar vocabulary while reading.

Comprehension (Understanding the Meaning of Text)

We explicitly teach students strategies for understanding the meaning of text, including making predictions, asking questions, making connections, and summarizing. Students learn to think critically about what they read across different types of texts.



Writing Instruction

We teach students how to write by developing six parallel components:

Phonemic Awareness (Breaking Words into Sounds and Syllables)
Students learn to break down words they hear into individual sounds
and syllables, which helps them spell words accurately when writing.
This skill bridges the connection between spoken and written language.

Phonics (Encoding)

Students learn to represent sounds with correct spellings, moving from hearing sounds to writing them down. This encoding process is the reverse of decoding and helps students become confident spellers.

Transcribing (Letter Formation and Conventions)

We teach students to correctly form letters and use proper spacing and punctuation. These foundational skills ensure that students can clearly communicate their ideas in writing.

Fluency (Building Automaticity)

Students develop automatic recall of spelling patterns and writing conventions so they can focus their mental energy on expressing their ideas rather than struggling with basic writing mechanics.



Writing Instruction (continued)

Background Knowledge (Topics and Written Language Structure)

Through our Knowledge Rich curriculum, students develop deep understanding of the topics they write about while also learning the structures of different types of writing. This comprehensive approach helps them organize and develop their ideas effectively across various writing genres.

Vocabulary (Words and Their Meanings)

Our Knowledge Rich curriculum naturally exposes students to sophisticated academic vocabulary within meaningful contexts. Students learn to use precise and varied vocabulary in their writing, expanding their ability to express complex ideas and emotions clearly and effectively.

Written Expression (The Ultimate Goal!)

All of these skills come together to help students communicate their thoughts, ideas, and creativity through writing. Students learn to write for different purposes and audiences, developing their unique voice as writers.



Our Mathematics Program

We are committed to creating positive mathematical experiences that build confidence and enthusiasm for mathematics. Every student deserves to see themselves as capable of mathematical thinking, and our evidence-based approach ensures student develop both the skills and mindset needed for lifelong mathematical success.

At Muyan Primary School, we believe:

Every student can learn mathematics

We maintain high expectations for all learners and provide the support each child needs to succeed.

Mistakes and effort promote brain growth

We celebrate mistakes as learning opportunities and recognize that effort leads to mathematical understanding.

Conceptual understanding comes first

Students learn why mathematical strategies work, not just how to use them.

Making connections deepens learning

We help students see relationships between mathematical ideas and connect mathematics to the real world.

Fluency and problem-solving work together

Students develop both automatic recall of number facts and strong problem-solving skills.

Challenges help us grow

We encourage students to embrace mathematical challenges and persist through difficult problems.

Our mathematics program follows research-proven instructional methods that systematically build student proficiency across four key areas:

- Problem-Solving:
- Students learn to approach mathematical challenges with confidence and multiple strategies
- Fluency:
- Students develop automatic recall and efficient computational methods
- Understanding:
- Students build deep conceptual knowledge of mathematical ideas



Knowledge Rich Humanities Curriculum

At Muyan Primary School, we use a Knowledge Rich curriculum approach to teach the humanities subjects from the Victorian Curriculum, including History, Geography, Civics and Citizenship, and Economics and Business. This approach ensures that students develop a broad and deep understanding of the world around them by systematically building their knowledge across cultures, time periods, and global perspectives. Rather than focusing solely on generic skills, our Knowledge Rich curriculum deliberately exposes students to rich content that expands their cultural literacy, vocabulary, and ability to make meaningful connections between past and present, local and global events.

Our humanities program recognizes that knowledge is the foundation for critical thinking and informed citizenship. Through carefully sequenced units that build on each other, students develop not only factual knowledge about important historical events, geographical features, and civic processes, but also the analytical skills needed to evaluate sources, understand different perspectives, and engage thoughtfully with complex social issues. This comprehensive approach prepares our students to be knowledgeable, empathetic global citizens who can contribute meaningfully to their communities and understand their place in the wider world.



Specialist Subjects

At Muyan Primary School, we enhance our core curriculum with three specialist subjects that support the whole child's development:

- Physical Education (PE)
- Science
- Performing Arts
- Visual Arts

These specialist programs are taught by dedicated teachers who bring expertise and passion to their subject areas, providing students with rich learning experiences that complement and extend their classroom learning. Our specialist subjects ensure that students develop physical literacy, scientific inquiry skills, and creative expression while discovering their individual talents and interests.

Each specialist subject plays a vital role in developing well-rounded learners who are prepared for future success. Physical Education builds students' physical skills, teamwork abilities, and understanding of health and fitness, while our Science program fosters curiosity, critical thinking, and hands-on investigation skills through exciting experiments and discoveries. Performing Arts allows students to explore their creativity through music, drama, and movement, building confidence, communication skills, and cultural appreciation. Together these specialist subjects create a dynamic and engaging school experience that helps every student discover their strengths and develop a lifelong love of learning.



Wellbeing & inclusion

At Muyan Primary School, every child is supported to feel valued, and empowered to reach their full potential. Our comprehensive approach to Wellbeing and Inclusion ensures all students can thrive in a nurturing environment where differences are celebrated, wellbeing is prioritized, and every student thrives.

Our structured Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) curriculum explicitly teaches students essential skills to understand themselves, connect with others, and navigate challenges with resilience. Through programs such as The Resilience Project, lessons support students to develop self-awareness, emotional regulation, and empathy while building strong foundations for mental health and wellbeing.

Together, we create an inclusive community where every child at Muyan Primary School can flourish, develop strong relationships, and build confidence to face future challenges with resilience and optimism.





Homework and Home Reading Expectations

Muyan Primary School values the role families play in supporting their childs education. Homework is an opportunity share in the learning and celebrate achievements.

Weekly, students will bring home a Decodable reader that is targeted to the letters and sounds they are currently learning. It is an expectation that children read at least five night per week for at least 10 minutes.

This repeated practise will build on the skills that are being taught in class. Students who have established decoding skills will be supported to bring home texts that will strengthen their fluency and comprehension of what they are reading.

Students and families will also be encouraged to practice Number Facts as part of weekly homework expectations.

Number Facts are the building blocks for more complex maths skills and practising these leads to fluency (automaticity) when engaging in algebra and problem solving.

Muyan PS aims to serve as a welcoming hub for the Wallara Waters community.

We ask that all visitors report to the administration building on arrival, where a member of our admin staff will will support you with any enquiries you may have. If you need to access the school site for any reason you will be asked to sign in as a visitor and may be asked to show your Working With Children Check (WWWC)

Families may enter the school grounds from 8:20am until 8:30am to drop off children at their classroom door and meet their child/ren on the school site from 3:00pm at dismissal.
